SENIOR EXECUTIVE REPORT

The school year is quickly coming to an end. The holidays and festive season are just around the corner and school activities are ramping up right to the end. Recognition and reward are important aspects of the learning and teaching cycle. This is the time of year when we are able to recognise the achievements of our students and reward the efforts of those students who have been working diligently throughout the year. The time of year, when as a school we challenge students on broader issues, such as resilience, leadership and the transition to work. Here some of the knowledge, skills and attitudes learned during the year can be practised in real world situations.

In these remaining weeks of school, our students are taking up opportunities in job trialling, work experience, peer support leadership and teamwork activities such as the Year 9 camp to Stradbroke Island. Students have been giving back to our community both individually and through activities such as the work of our Green Team - Cleaning up the Creek. Our SRC, led by Ms Mainey have been promoting school spirit through a range of activities and supporting causes such as Movember. In the final few days of school, at our Annual Presentation Day, Year Assemblies and the Achievement Excursion we will be recognising and rewarding the efforts of students to improve themselves this year, not just academically, but as young people; our young people. Young people we are very proud of. As a school, it is our hope that the students involved in these positive activities have fun participating, as there is more to a "good education" than the "3R's"; and learning should be fun.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank our P&C Committee for their work in and for our school over the past year. From their monetary support for projects through uniform sales and support in lobbying government for better classroom conditions to the interest shown in learning about the work of staff and students across the school; asking questions and promoting parental perspectives. This small team have worked with staff to promote the school and support student learning. Their final event for this year is the P&C Dinner at 6pm (NSW) on November 28 at Rama 5 Thai. In between all this at times frenetic activity, the school is also planning for 2020. Staff are evaluating the programs and strategies employed in 2019; preparing to deliver new syllabuses and support programs to meet the identified learning needs of our students. On Tuesday, December 3rd, we will welcome our next cohort of students for Year 7, 2020. A full day of activities and information sharing for Year 6 is being planned to support our new cohort in their transition to high school.

2020 will be an exciting year for Tweed River High School. The NSW Department of Education and School Infrastructure NSW remains committed to changing Tweed River High School students' lives, providing them with the educational infrastructure needed to inspire growth, build capability and transferrable, practical skills that last a lifetime.

The project is currently in the planning phase and project management and design consultants have now been engaged. Future focused learning workshops are being held with the Tweed River High School teaching staff, students and community members.

The work being planned for Tweed River High School will upgrade core facilities to address enrolment growth, providing practical learning spaces aligned with the best emerging practises in teaching and learning. Updates relating to the design, scope of works and construction timeline will be communicated to the community shortly.

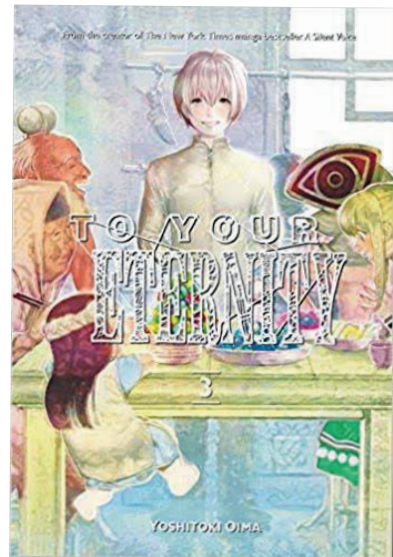
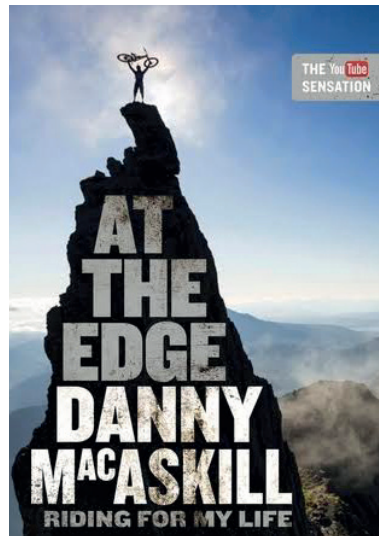
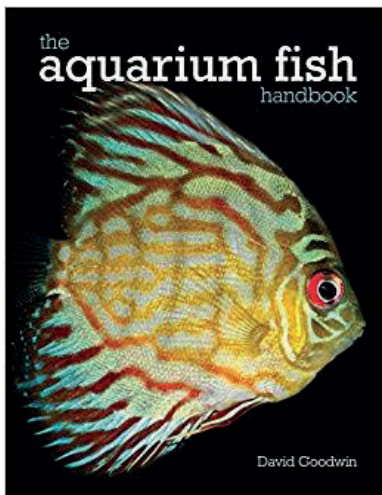
LIBRARY NEWS

YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE GUIDE 2019

Dear Parents of Year 10 Students

Year 10 students have the opportunity to participate in a week of work experience in Term 4.

Work experience is a fantastic opportunity for students to try out a job they are considering aiming for in the future, to get a better appreciation of working life, to network locally for part time and casual positions and to build employment skill sets. We highly recommend your students involvement in this program.

The following points should be noted:

- Students are required to seek out their own placement. Approaching employers, providing a resume and following up leads is all reflective of a real job search and is an important learning task for students who are often engaging in this process for the first time. The careers adviser and work experience coordinator are there to provide support and assistance at all times.
- We encourage students to “think big”. Options are wide and varied and not restricted to our local area.
- The preferred dates for work experience are noted below.
- Students work a normal working week for their place of employment. The placement is considered part of their schooling and any absences from work need to be communicated to the school & employer.
- All students will be provided with documentation to plan in for this experience.
- All documentation should be fully completed and handed in to your careers adviser or work experience coordinator at least two weeks prior to the placement.
- Students on discipline lists are not eligible for work experience.
- Placements involving work on job sites will require a White Card.
- All general information has been given to students so they can start organising work experience. Please contact Tweed River High School if you would like any additional information.
- Work experience can be challenging, fun and a huge learning experience for students. Every year we enjoy hearing about these rewarding experiences.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.





Talking to Young People about Alcohol and Drugs

It is best for education about alcohol and drugs to begin before young people are exposed to personal decisions about their use. Young people who have accurate information, coping and decision making skills and understand the issues, will be in a good position to make responsible decisions about alcohol and drugs.

Parents are a powerful role model when it comes to drinking and attitudes to alcohol and other drugs. Take time to talk. Sitting down with the young person in your care and mapping out a plan of action and what to say if they are offered drugs or alcohol can help equip them for the almost inevitable real event. Listen to what the young person in your family says about alcohol and drugs and follow up with a discussion. Take the opportunities when they come up during everyday activities, for example:

- When you pour a glass of alcohol
- When alcohol or other drugs are mentioned on TV or other media
- When using or giving out medicines
- When your young person has an assignment on alcohol, smoking, medicines or other drugs.

It is important to understand that in some situations young people may take risks. Sitting down afterwards and helping them identify where things started to go wrong enables them to consider what they could do differently the next time they are faced with a similar situation.

Australian Alcohol Guideline for Children and young people under 18

Not drinking alcohol is the safest option.

For children under 15

Parents and carers are advised that children under 15 years of age are at the greatest risk of harm from drinking and that for this age group, not drinking is especially important.

For Young people aged 15-18 years

The safest option is to delay the initiation of drinking for as long as possible.

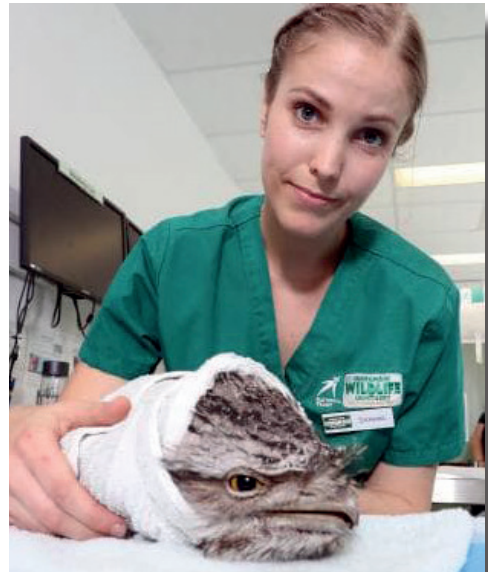

Bringing up Great Kids

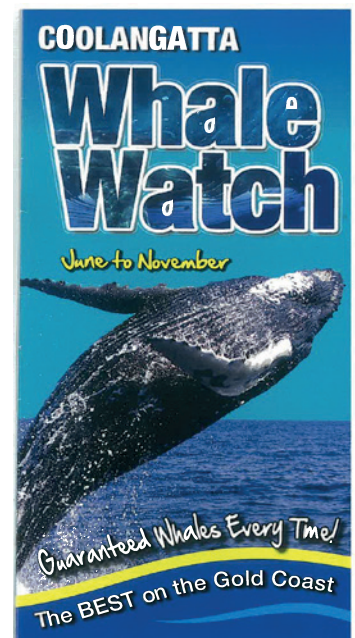
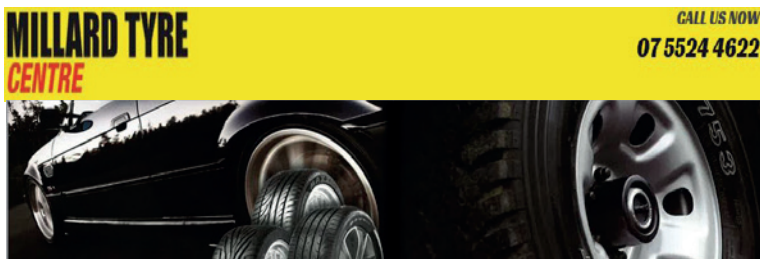
